On the field we seemed to have highlights at every turn with another fantastic Shute Shield season providing a fairy tale finish in front of a packed house as North Sydney Oval, the suburban rugby finals all going off without a hitch and a schools competition that went right to the wire. Without doubt from a community perspective 2017 was a very successful year.

As always the pressures to fill games was present, and with limited resources at times we were stretched. However, I am proud to say that as a result of the amazing efforts of those within this association we were able to fill all but **ONE** fixture this year, and in doing so, ensured that games of rugby were able to take place. On behalf of the association and the union I would like to thank you all for your on-going commitment to the game we all love.

Off Field

Off the field the hard work continued, as we look to develop a culture of inclusiveness and family that is the rugby referee way. As the largest association in Sydney, I believe it is integral that we lead by example and provide an inclusive environment where everyone is welcomed and valued, as we strive for the betterment of refereeing across the city.

The introduction of the 'Home Ground' at the Imperial Hotel in Paddington prior to all Waratahs games was a new initiative aimed at bringing together referees from all associations to foster the culture of inclusiveness, whilst also showing our members that they are a part of a bigger team. Not only did these events provide an excellent opportunity for referees within NSW to socialize, but it also gave us a fantastic opportunity to show our support for our home union, and thank them for the support they provide us all. Unfortunately this wasn't the success that I had hoped it to be in terms of number of people in attendance at each game, but it was pleasing to hear from those who attended that they enjoyed the opportunity to get together as a group.

The social highlight of the year came in June when the association hosted Bledisloe Cup referees Wayne Barnes and Andrew Bracey at Eastern Suburbs rugby club. We were lucky enough to enjoy the company of more than 50 people and I'm sure all who attended would agree that it was an extremely entertaining evening. It was also pleasing to be able to support the rugby community, and specifically the Eastern Suburbs rugby club by hosting the event in their clubhouse and providing an income stream for them in a challenging season. In keeping with my desire to foster an inclusive environment and one, which welcomes all people with open arms, the decision was made by your executive to make this a free event, with the association covering all costs of the evening. This investment in our people has had a direct impact on our balance sheet, but I consider any investment that brings together our membership a worthy one.

The final event on the social calendar came with the Annual Presentation and Awards evening, once again held at the magnificent Establishment Ballroom. We were lucky to be joined by a number of our life members, as well as the wider membership, to celebrate another successful year of refereeing within Sydney. In addition it was so pleasing to see so many 'rugby widows' in attendance at this year's function, the support and understanding of our endeavours from our better halves is important to recognise, and without it we wouldn't be the association we are. Thank you to all who came to celebrate the season that was and congratulations to all award winners.

Sponsorship

It is with great excitement that I am able to announce that the association in conjunction with the district associations and NSWRU has secured a sponsorship deal for the next three years with Patties Pies. This is an exciting culmination to a number of years of hard work by a lot of people. The investment in the professional valuation of the Shute Shield exposure has had the desired return and in doing so has placed refereeing in NSW in a very healthy financial position for its future.

Representation

2017 saw the first time that NSWRRA was invited to partake in meetings with the Sydney Rugby Referee Consultative Council (SRCC), which has operated for a number of years. This group consisting of the various referee association Presidents was designed to enhance the flow of knowledge and experiences between the associations with the aim of improving the overall experience of referees within Sydney. It is extremely pleasing to be invited to join this group and I look forward to a more common working environment, which will ensure we can best use the resources available to enhance the refereeing experience for all members.

NSWRU

2017 saw NSWRU engage in the task of re-structuring the organisation. It was pleasing to be able to represent referees within the state in these meetings. I believe the structure adopted will ensure the long-term success and financial viability of rugby in the state.

National Conference

I was fortunate enough to attend the National Referees Conference held in Brisbane. This fantastic initiative from the ARU allowed the Presidents from around the country to get together in a room and share knowledge, whilst also working to assist the ARU with the key issues each association is experiencing. Hearing from the other associations, it made me so proud to be representing you all, and for the special things we have within our team. It's often easy to get caught up in the negatives that we forget to smell the roses and enjoy our successes. I thank the ARU for their kind hospitality and commitment to refereeing across the country.

Match Payments

In the recent survey carried out a number of our members identified that they were concerned with our current level of match payments. I am pleased to advise that the association has worked closely with NSWRU to find a solution through re-distributing some funds within refereeing to achieve and increase of match payments to \$30 a game for all referees, whilst also allowing us to pay a small fee for all assistant referee appointments.

Shirts

Like every team a uniform is a fantastic way to bring a group together and help people identify as part of a team. This year the association invested in a new set of match day shirts for everyone to wear. Many thanks to you all for your fantastic modelling throughout the season, I look forward to seeing more and more of them in 2018.

ARU Survey

We recently received the results of the ARU survey from the end of 2017, of which 117 of you kindly took the time to respond. This survey provides the executive with an insight into how you

feel things are going within our ranks. Many thanks for all who took time to comment and provide feedback.

May I remind you all that we are here to help, and are the collective voice to address any and all of these issues. Please feel free to contact me directly with any issues you may have and I am more than willing to provide commentary or go and find an answer for you. Your association continues to work with NSWRU to try and make this association as successful as possible, whilst also ensuring that it is an association for everyone and not just the elite level of the game.

NSW RUGBY REFEREE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The priority in 2017 has been on increasing the number of referee coaches and changing the focus of those referee coaches from a 'transactional' one to working with referees over a season or longer period. This meant that most referees were allocated to a referee coaching group in 2017, and worked with their coach to produce an Individual Season Plan and then to refer back to that during the year. More work needs to be done in 2018 to embed this as the new way of doing business. I welcome our eight new referee coaches – Flip van der Westhuizen, Antony Hastie, Gerard Rigby, Mike Hobson, Chris Pearl, Garron Buttress-Grove, Lindsay Spencer and Anthony Moyes. Five of these gentlemen are both refereeing and referee coaching (and AR'ing 1st grade if they're really enthusiastic!). With these additional referee coaches we were able to coach 160 of 175 referees appointed in 2017 at least once, and 132 were coached twice or more. Considering that only 158 referees did more than 5 games (the definition of 'active'), this is pretty good. However, we're aiming to see every active referee twice in 2018.

The emphasis on increasing the number of coaches and the number of referees in coaching groups is partly in response to the results of the 2016 ARU Match Official survey, where it was identified by NSWRRA members that the lack of a fair and transparent 'pathway' was your biggest issue. It must be acknowledged that NSWRU only has ownership of a small part of that pathway, and we must work with Rugby Australia to bring light to this area. Part of this transparency was the introduction by RA of a new talent ID matrix where each person on that matrix (we had over 25 in NSWRRA) was rated in 29 different aspects of the RA profile and given feedback by RA coaches about how they were performing in those areas. In most cases RA Talent ID coaches viewed referees in person early in the season in order to select referees for development tournaments later in the season. It should be noted that RA is only interested in Talent ID'ing future Super Rugby referees, so their criteria are stringent, and reflect the limited resources and games available for RA to develop referees.

The NSWRU Referee Department has a wider remit to recruit and develop sufficient referees for the game in NSW. We abolished three 'development' squads in 2017 (PRP, SRIP and MRIP), partly in response to feedback about the value of those groups from Amy's 2016 survey about those coaching groups, but mainly so that we could have more referees in coaching groups. The only 'development' squads we retain are the Sydney Transition Group (for those in their first year with NSWRA, primarily school leavers) and the Sydney Development Program (to develop referees with the potential to referee at Barraclough Cup/Premier 4th Grade level in the next three years). We believe that in general these referees benefit from a structured program. The Referee Coach Panel agreed that referees who already have the skills and experience to referee at Barraclough Cup level require a more individualised approach, which a coaching group provides. The percentage of NSWRRA respondents who disagreed that the development pathway was fair and transparent fell from 45% in 2016 to 36% in 2017, so there is still some work to do. I will be working with all referee coaches (along with the Management Committee and the Coach-the-Coach team) to improve the functioning of coaching groups in 2018 so that this percentage continues to fall.

During the year you may have heard that we have a referee shortage. This is only partially true. On most weekends we have enough referees on paper to cover the games allocated. But at certain times of the year (generally around May) we find that referees get injured, go on holidays, are working or getting married, and suddenly we don't have enough referees – particularly who are capable of doing 1st Grade Subbies and above, or are willing to travel

to the ends of the earth to cover a Div 6 game. How to solve this? We need to continually recruit new referees and to develop our existing referees so that we have sufficient referees available who can cover those more difficult games. That development takes several years. The down-side of recruitment and development is that those referees who are unable or unwilling to improve may drop back in grading or get less appointments. However, there is a role for every current or ex-referee who wants to give back – we need referee coaches, mentors, referees for junior and school games, assistant referees, course presenters, advocates and supporters. Get in touch with the Referee Department, a referee coach, or your association executive if you don't know how you can assist but want to find out.

Sevens were a large (and increasing) part of the Referee Department calendar. This started with managing the referees at the inaugural Beach 5s in Feb (7 refs), closely followed by Kiama 7s (16 refs and 5 ref coaches). In June we covered the state finals of the Secondary School 7s at the Kings School (13 refs and 4 ref coaches). In October we covered three tournaments – the State U13/15 Finals at Coffs Harbour (9 refs and 3 ref coaches), State U17 and Women's Finals at Narrabeen (14 refs and 5 ref coaches), and the Central Coast Youth 7s at Wyong (10 refs and 1 ref coach). In Nov we covered the (new) Western Sydney 7s (9 refs and 1 ref coach) and then finished the year with the Blue Mountains 7s (14 refs and 1 ref coach) in Dec. There were a lot of referees who did multiple tournaments and the standard and consistency of 7s refereeing was very good. In total 48 NSWRRA members were involved in these tournaments. It was very pleasing to see the improvement within each tournament and across tournaments.

NSWRU reached the end of the three year agreement with Gilbert to provide referee kit, and celebrated this by providing an alternate strip (which will be familiar to those of you who've been around since 2006). Most of the complaints around this strip were around how large the collar is, which have been weighed against those who previously complained that there was no collar at all. We also upgraded from cotton to polyester shorts, which was so popular that we ran out. For 2018 NSWRU has signed with Canterbury (again), so we will be getting a new jersey, and it will have a collar someone in between the two extremes.

This coincides with NSW Referees finally having a sponsor. Patties (manufacturer of Four and Twenty Pies) will be the jersey sponsor for referees in Sydney for the next three years. Thanks to the efforts of the executives of NSWRRA and the three district referee associations, as well as the NSW Waratahs Sales & Hospitality department, for getting this deal across the line. The revenue will be shared between all five organisations.

NSWRU cut the ties with Murray Tregonning for Shute Shield comms gear after many years of excellent service. Finally the competition (in this case Mark Langlands from L&W Sports Communication) have caught up so that the quality of the kit is adequate. The intent is to use the considerable cost savings to purchase more kits each year so that additional competitions use it (starting with Colts 1), and more referees are exposed to it.

The other big issue for NSWRRA referees from the Rugby AU MO survey was the level of reimbursements. I did some preliminary work with your President at the start of 2017 to try to implement changes this year, but it could not be accommodated in the budget. We are now in the position to increase the standard reimbursement for referee and referee coach appointments, and to implement (for the first time) a reimbursement for all AR appointments. This hopefully covers the cost of an additional sausage sandwich and parking . . . This is partially being funded by a reduction in the reimbursement for Shute Shield appointments, as well as increase in the fees charged to schools. More information to follow on this.



It would be remiss of me to not to thank the NSW Referee Department staff. Michael Doyle (Senior Manager Development and Match Officials) has done a marvellous job of shepherding the four Sydney Referee associations through some governance changes as well as being a shoulder to cry on for everyone (every day is Christmas day!). Luke Rogan leaves for New York after two years as Referee Appointments and Development Officer. He is justifiably proud of the lack of club-to-appoints on his watch. I'm sure he'll soon be one of the leading referees in the USA. His replacement will be announced shortly. Ron Mancell continues to provide an excellent service to NSW Country Referees in particular, but has also coached NSWRRA members at various development and 7s tournaments this year, and courses all over the state. Unfortunately funding changes at Rugby AU meant that Amy Perrett became a full-time RA employee at the start of 2017. We miss her around the office and wish her all the best in her Referee career! Stuart 'Noddy' Wright also replaced Scott Rogan (and briefly Luke) as the Central Appointments Officer for the three Sydney district associations.

We would like to acknowledge the efforts of all referees and referee coaches who officiated during 2017. A special thankyou to Daniel Cheever (Premier Appointments), Ian Fraser (Subbies Appointments), the Referee Management Committee (Phil Baird, Daniel Cheever, Peter Marshall and Ian Smith), Russell Trotter and Cliff Dodds (Coach the Coach), Grading Coordinators (Ian Mooney and Joh Goh), Development Squad coaches (David Chapman, Ian Mooney, Ian Pascoe and Greg Whiteley), Subbies Finals Group Coordinators (Roger Higgins, John Goh, Ian Fraser, David Chapman, Ian Mooney and Ian Pascoe), and the NSWRRA executive (you know who they are).

2017 was another memorable year for rugby in Sydney. The year finished with a spectacular Grand Final at North Sydney with crowd favourites Warringah winning the Shute Shield premiership.

For our elite referees, there were once again a number of significant highlights:

- Angus Gardner was once again selected for Six Nations & Rugby Championship appointments. He was also selected to couple of fixtures during the Lions Tour of New Zealand.
- Will Houston enjoyed his second season as a Super Rugby referee.
- James Leckie and Ian Smith were appointed by the IRB as an Assistant Referee and TMO respectively

We experienced a great Shute Shield season due to the evenness of the First Grade teams. Our referees facilitated some fantastic contests and it was fitting that a huge crowd was there to see Warringah win the premiership. Angus Gardner was appointed to the First Grade Grand Final and made a valuable contribution to the occasion.

Matt Kellahan was recognised as the Shute Shield Referee of the Year by winning the Dick Byres Medal for the second year in a row. James Quinn, James Marshall and Lincoln Stollery made their First Grade debuts in 2017.

The Association put on anther enjoyable Annual Dinner in what has become the highlight of the referee social calendar. Congratulations to the 2017 Award Winners & those referees who celebrated significant milestones.

A number of our newer referees showed a lot of potential with strong performances in the lower grades and Subbies Rugby. I would particularly like to highlight the strong performances of many new referees who were promoted to Group D. I look forward to seeing their progress in the coming seasons.

2017 was my second year as Chairman. We continued our focus on improving our governance and transparency. The Management Committee Charter was finalised in early 2017 and adopted by the NSWRU Board.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Association is not a reporting entity as defined in Statement of Accounting Concepts SAC 1, Definition of the Reporting Entity, and therefore is not required to prepare financial statements in accordance with Statements of Accounting Concepts and Accounting Standards.
