PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The season of 2005 has passed in a flash, proving once again how busy the Rugby calendar is in NSW. As we know, the expanded Super 14 competition commences on February 10 2006, and if trial matches are taken into account, some of our referees will be up and running virtually from the New Year. Be careful on New Year's Eve, lads!

Considering the number of matches controlled by our referees in a season, it is fair to say that we have once again excelled ourselves at all levels. We remain the most accomplished rugby refereeing body in this country by far, and I challenge anyone to find another that outshines us internationally. To some extent, it is a shame that geography and neutrality dictate the make-up of the world's top referees, as many of our members have the ability to excel if the opportunity existed.

Unfortunately, this means that due to the congestion at the top level, some referees who would be more than capable of "making it" never do, and occasionally of course, the reverse applies. This phenomenon is not only applicable to rugby refereeing, and is manifest when a group of people, whether players, referees, coaches or whoever have a common desire to excel.

There is, of course, a flow-on effect throughout an association such as ours, whereby some referees, at all levels, have a burning desire to referee at a higher level, only to find their progress halted through, seemingly no fault of their own, leading to frustration and resentment. This partly arises through the subjective nature of our assessment and appointing process, but equally, if not more so, because of the high standard we continue to set. Of course, this must not be looked upon as a negative, but rather, we should be thankful that we have a body rich in talented individuals plying their wares on and off the field.

As always, the jigsaw which forms refereeing in NSW consists of many people. My thanks go to all our referees who do an outstanding job. It's not always easy, but good things never are. There is so much to be gained from doing what we do, but ultimately it is about the people we come across week to week.

Our appreciation goes to our coaches - affectionately referred to by some as "The Dark Side" - who put in enormous amounts of their own time for the benefit of the active referees. To Brian Kinsey and Cliff Dodds, especially, your efforts are greatly appreciated.

Once again, the NSWRU, in particular the Referee Department headed by Ron Mancell, has been of huge assistance to us. Ron, Robin Timmins and Jamie MacGregor in their respective roles, have all contributed enormously and for that we are very grateful. The support from NSWRU comes in many ways, but perhaps the most tangible are tickets to representative matches, reimbursement, and the Dick Byres Medal. Our thanks go to CEO Fraser Neill and his team.

This year also saw the reintroduction of interchange with the Auckland Society of Rugby Referees during which we hosted Sheldon Eden-Whaitiri. We hope to continue this arrangement over the coming years.

We are also grateful to our long standing trainer, Matt Donohue, who will not be with us from next season. Matt has done a terrific job in increasing the fitness levels of many referees over many years and will be missed.



On the social scene, there was a well attended barbecue to farewell Matt, and a small number of gatherings when we hosted our interchange guest from Auckland. Les Pritchard and Michael Blair did an outstanding job in billeting him and once again, our thanks go to these gentlemen. The major event was, as usual, the Annual Dinner which was held this year at the Crowne Plaza, Darling Harbour with assistance from Antony Hastie. Our Treasurer, Phil Baird stepped in at the last minute for an ill James Dickson to do the MC'ing and did a great job. The guest speaker was Ross Reynolds who entertained us with stories of his distinguished playing and coaching careers. The night was a tremendous success, and once again proved that we have a fantastic group of younger referees in whose hands the future of our association looks assured. As always, it was great to see a number of our Life Members present. These people have done, and in some cases continue to do great work in building this Association to where it is today, and their contribution must never go understated.

Appropriately, the Dinner also served as our Awards Night, the recipients of which may be viewed elsewhere in the Annual Report. Congratulations go to all those who were honoured with awards.

Congratulations are also due to all those who refereed Grand Finals. Special mention must go to Matt Goddard, who refereed his first Tooheys New Cup grand final, and did an outstanding job. Matt had a huge year as he also refereed his first Test match, after a false start or two the previous year. Traditionally, NSWRRA members receive an "illuminated address" on achieving Test referee status, and Matt's was presented at the Annual Dinner. It is reproduced in full elsewhere in the Annual Report.

In addition to Matt, we also had Stuart Dickinson and George Ayoub featuring prominently on the world stage. When they appear as regularly as they do, it is easy to become blasé. However, their achievements must never be overlooked. We are very proud of these fellows.

My personal thanks go to my Executive team of Michael Blair (Secretary), Phil Baird (Treasurer), and Wayne Rubin (General Member). These fellows have been truly outstanding, and despite having their own busy lives carry out their respective tasks punctually, diligently and at all times, with good humour.

NSW RUGBY REFEREE DEPARTMENT REPORT

2005 was a challenging year for the appointment of referees to matches. While there has been a substantial increase in numbers of referees recorded on the ARU database, MyRugbyAdmin, in 2005, this has not translated into increased numbers of referees available to officiate on any given weekend. In fact the reverse has been the case as there has been a shortage of available referees in 2005 and a subsequent increase in multiple appointments.

Multiple appointments coupled with the ravages of an ageing resource, contributed to the lessening of available referees through injury and disenchantment. To counter this trend in the early part of the season, NSWRU implemented a point score system in July 2005, which limited the number of appointments a referee can do in any one day. While this system then limited the number of matches that could be covered by the existing referee asset, it stemmed the tide of injuries and early retirements.

Two other issues, which affected appointments, bear scrutiny. NSWRU has continued to support referees who limit their availability either geographically or to specific times during the day. This in turn limits the appointments to which these referees can be appointed. Quite often this results in these referees being appointed to matches beneath their grading with subsequent dissatisfaction being expressed to the appointing authority. However, the responsibility for these outcomes sits squarely with those referees that limit their availability. Unfortunately, the appointments cannot be tailored to this minority at the expense of the majority who make themselves freely available.

The other issue is the volatility of appointments, particularly early to mid season. This volatility is caused by the combined factors of referee availability and number of games. This is particularly the case at the start of the School Season when there is a marked increase in the number of matches. If this is coupled with the non-availability of our senior referees (due to Super 12, Representative or Test Appointments), then many referees find themselves doing matches one and sometimes two grades above the norm. This may go on for a couple of weeks but will then be followed by a weekend where the schools are not playing and the senior referees are available. The obvious then occurs as everyone steps back, sometimes even below the grade they would normally be doing.

Whilst discussing the issues relating to the grading of matches, it is also important to understand the importance of New South Wales Suburban Division 5 and 6 matches in the context of appointments. Division 5 and 6 matches can be of a high standard and should not be compared unfavourably with higher division matches. In addition, given the lack of peer support (no other referees appointed to these grounds) accompanying these appointments, referees who are appointed to them should congratulate themselves on being considered strong enough to hold their own in an often hostile environment.

To overcome the shortage of referees, NSWRU was forced to allocate matches to the home team rather than double up referees. These "Club to Appoint" (CTA) matches were allotted across the whole spectrum of rugby and amounted to as many as 22 matches on any given weekend.



The implementation of the NSWRU Referee Recruiting Policy in 2005 should have alleviated the problems described above. From implementation, all clubs had a responsibility to develop one referee and two touch judges for every two teams or part thereof in the club. Some clubs embraced the policy and have achieved the required benchmarks but others paid lip service to it by naming existing association members as their club referees. The consequence of this short sighted view was that when these clubs were required to appoint to their own fixtures, they had no referees available as their named referees were fulfilling his or her normal association appointment.

Anecdotally, Referee Abuse continues to be the single biggest factor cited by referees who become inactive. It is also the factor cited by potential referees in their rejection of the notion of becoming a referee. The culture of blaming the referee continues to be **the** factor effecting recruiting and retention.

The method used to become a referee changed substantially in 2005. Potential referees now attend a course called the Foundation Course, pass a law and management exam and are then field-tested. A potential referee can be successful on his first field test rather than having to do five matches as in the past. However, the biggest change is in the Foundation Course.

Previously, the referee course was an 8-hour theoretical course in a classroom. The foundation course is a mix of classroom and practical. It provides the basic skills to referee a match **and** coach a team. There is an emphasis on game understanding, which was not provided in previous referee courses. Its introduction in 2005 was very well received. The referee it produces is better prepared to referee and has a better understanding of what the players and coaches are trying to achieve.

NSWRU delivered this course to over 1100 people and while the majority are likely to coach, it has provided the union with a large pool of people who have been given the minimum skills and knowledge to allow them to referee a match, should an accredited referee not be appointed or fail to turn up.

Level 2 Referee and L2 Touch Judge Courses were conducted throughout the season to cater to the needs of NSWRRA. In particular, the non-continuous Level 2 Touch Judge Course run over 3 Referee Education Nights was particularly successful. Referee Education for NSWRRA Referees included the following:

Basic Positioning all phases of play; What to expect from your coach; Competition Rules and U19 Laws; The Tackle; Shape of the Game Statistics; How the Club Coaches perceive our performance; Communications Protocols; Ball Line Running; and Fitness, Nutrition and Injury Management during the off-season.

Wednesday Night Fitness training continued to be well attended in 2005. In 2006 we will be starting the training a little earlier to cater for referees who wish to get fit prior to the season commencement.

NSWRU employed a fitness consultant to do research into fitness standards for referees. The consultant had the dual aims of setting a minimum safe fitness standard for refereeing senior matches and setting benchmarks for various grades. The research has been completed and its results will be implemented in 2006.



NSWRU would like to acknowledge the support and hard work of Robin Timmins, Jamie McGregor, Brian Kinsey, Cliff Dodds, the entire Coaching Panel and the Executive of NSWRRA. Collectively we would also like to acknowledge all the referees who provided the union with their valuable assistance throughout the year.

COACHING AND GRADING PANEL REPORT

The Panel again operated as one body this year following the successful implementation of this method during the previous season. Although we did not meet as a full unit as many times this year we are planning to change this during 2006.

During the season Vic Whitely resigned from the panel after having served on various Boards involving coaching for many years. We offer our thanks for his contribution over this time.

This left a gap in the ranks of the coach coaches which was filled by Cliff Dodds who ably assisted our long time mentor Kevin Meyer. Kevin in fact has indicated that he wishes to reduce his work load during 2006 and plans are in place to ensure that the coaches continue to receive feed back on their performance during the coming season.

This year saw an addition to the Panel Executive with Greg West joining the ranks to be a conduit between the Executive and the panel coaches. One of the prime functions was to ensure that the coaching methods operating at a NSW level complimented those being used at the ARU level with their Academy.

The Executive met on a monthly basis and worked through the day to day operational matters that arose.

Once again the talent identification process worked well with feed back coming in weekly from coaches at all levels. The information gathered from the coach website from all the reports makes it very easy to review performances both individually and collectively.

The change in the structure of the Grade competitions and playing times threw out a number of challenges for not only the coaches but also the referees themselves. It is to be hoped that these structures will be modified back to somewhere near how they had been in previous seasons for 2006.

The panel was made up by Andy Bernard, Angus Britts, Simon Brown, Grant Campbell, Cliff Dodds, Ian Fraser, John Goh, Andrew Halmarick, Nick Helyer, Roger Higgins, Terry Lloyd, Trevor Manuel, Max Miller, John Salisbury, Brian Shirvington, Norm Stevens, David Swan, Frank Tabone, Michael Tanzer, Brendan Taylor, David Waite, Greg West, Greg Whitely and during the middle of the season James Dickson assisted also. To all those who contributed my thanks for your efforts during the season and in particular those who joined the coaching ranks for the first time.

The assistance of Ron Mancell to the panel was appreciated and Ron attended all Executive meetings keeping the minutes. Our thanks also go out to Robin Timmins for all her efforts during the season.
